POSITION INFORMATION

Student Position Description Summary:

This student position involves serving as Monty the Mascot, representing Eastern Oregon University (EOU) at various community and university events throughout the year. Managed by the Marketing team within University Advancement, this role typically excludes athletic events, unless specifically requested by the Athletics Department, which manages its own mascot suit for sports-related activities.

Monty is expected to appear at 17 scheduled events between September 1 and June 16, with an additional 3 events in July and August if available. Each event generally lasts 1 to 2 hours. Given the limited hours, this role is ideal as a secondary job, with flexible attendance to accommodate academic responsibilities.

Job Duties/Responsibilities/Essential Functions:

Monty the Mascot plays a crucial role in engaging with students, faculty, staff, and the broader community at various events. Key responsibilities include:

- Interact with attendees, pose for photos, and maintain a playful, energetic, and sometimes mischievous demeanor to entertain and energize the crowd
- Attend and actively participate in events to boost school pride and represent EOU positively
- Stay in character, using expressive body language, and embody Monty's personality
- Always work with a handler, who provides guidance and ensures safe navigation, particularly in crowded or challenging environments
- The role requires physical fitness, including the ability to wear a warm and slightly heavy suit, navigate with limited vision, and remain animated. Monty must be at least 5' 10" tall for the suit to fit properly. Monty must be comfortable interacting with small children and dogs
- Arrive on time and follow the event plan, adapting to any unexpected situations.

HIRING CRITERIA

Minimum Qualifications:

- Must be at least 5' 10" tall to ensure the mascot suit fits properly
- The role requires physical stamina and the ability to perform animated movements while wearing a warm and slightly heavy suit. Must also be able to navigate stairs and move with limited vision.

Preferred Qualifications:

• A strong preference should be given to candidates with an outgoing, playful demeanor, as this directly impacts the ability to engage and entertain audiences.

- Mascots often work closely with event organizers, cheerleaders, and other team members to ensure that performances and appearances go smoothly. This fosters the ability to work effectively in a team.
- Mascots often encounter unexpected situations during events (e.g., technical difficulties, rowdy crowds), requiring quick thinking and adaptability
- Performing for different types of audiences (e.g., children vs. adults) helps mascots develop the ability to tailor their behavior and approach to suit different environments
- The role of a mascot requires a time commitment and the ability to fulfill responsibilities reliably, which demonstrates a strong work ethic.
- Mascots are the face of the university at many events, requiring professionalism and the ability to represent the university's values and brand effectively.
- Mascots often need to think on their feet and improvise during performances, which sharpens problem-solving skills and the ability to remain composed under pressure.
